

What have the Romans council ever done for us?

How often do we hear people say, "the council should do something about that" or "what do I pay my Council Tax for?" But do you know which council is responsible for providing each of our public services and spending your Council Tax? If the answer to these questions is "no", then you might find the following article useful.

Size matters

Local government in England can be difficult to understand. In some parts of the country (including other parts of Lancashire) there are **unitary** authorities like Blackpool and Blackburn with Darwen which provide most of their local council services funded through Council Tax.

Here in Carnforth the situation is a little more complicated where there are three levels of local government. First, we have **Lancashire County Council** which takes the lion's share of the Council Tax and is responsible for important services such as adult social care, children's services and many schools, highways, trading standards, libraries and archives, waste and recycling centres to name just a few.

We then have **Lancaster City Council**, responsible for housing, street cleaning, refuse collection, planning, parks and leisure facilities and environmental health. And last, but by no means least, we have the smallest body of local government, parish/town councils – in our case **Carnforth Town Council**.

The Town Council looks after community amenities such as the Civic Hall, the War Memorial and its garden, several bus shelters, litter bins, and the flower displays around the town. The Town Council has several specific powers at its disposal ranging from the provision and maintenance of allotments, open spaces and parks to public clocks!

Despite its relative size Carnforth Town Council has ambitions to develop Carnforth for residents, businesses and visitors alike. It works hard to promote a positive image of the town and in the last year it has actively campaigned against the proposed closure of the Station booking office and championed the major road resurfacing works on the A6, whilst challenging Lancashire County Council on the disruption the work caused at the time!

The Town Council has recently brought cinema back to Carnforth with the introduction of Film Nights at the Civic Hall and it sponsored the production of the successful Town Trail and Poppy Trail leaflets, the latter marking the centenary of the 1918 Armistice.

We also run annual events, notably, the Remembrance Day Service and Parade and Carnforth in Bloom and periodic Heritage Trails. In the last year we have also made great strides in improving communications with the local community through our bi-monthly newsletter, the *Carnforth Express*, social media (Facebook and Twitter) and our revitalised website.

The Town Council is currently working on the production of a Neighbourhood Plan for Carnforth designed to set down a blueprint for the development of Carnforth for the next decade. We consulted with the local community and the Chamber of Trade on our *Values, Vision and Objectives* and have recently been successful in securing funding to take this forward.

Carnforth Town councillors are proud to serve the community as committed (and unpaid) residents of the town. There are normally 12 town councillors and all places will be up for election in May.

What about the money?

Carnforth Town Council has four part-time employees including the Clerk to the Council who ensures the smooth administration of the Council's day-to-day business and sound financial management and whose duties include maintaining the Council's website, and Facebook and Twitter accounts.

The Town Council receives a very small proportion of your Council Tax to support its work in the form of a "precept" and for the coming financial year it will be asking for an average of 90p a week for a typical Band D property.

We believe the Town Council uses your money sensibly and honestly to promote, protect and develop our town. But we serve the local community and we want to hear what you think.



So, whether you have an idea about how we can make improvements to local amenities or you want reassurances about how we are spending the precept we want to hear from you. 


Carnforth Town Council is delighted to announce the next in its highly successful series of Film Night screenings at Carnforth Civic Hall.

Don't lose your right to vote: Time is running out for anyone who has not yet registered to vote if they want to make their mark in May's local elections. Voters will go to the polls on **Thursday 2nd May** to elect 60 new councillors to represent them on Lancaster City Council. 12 councillors for Carnforth Town Council will also be elected.

The deadline to register is **Friday 12th April**. Anyone registered after this time will not be able to vote and contrary to popular belief, you won't be automatically registered even if you pay council tax. Registering should only take around five minutes. Go to: <u>gov.uk/register-to-vote</u>

Become a councillor: All councils are led by democratically elected councillors who set the vision and direction and represent their local community. Councillors are elected to the local council to represent their own local community, so they must either live or work in the area.

Being an effective councillor requires both commitment and hard work, but the role offers the chance to make a huge difference to the quality of life for people in your local area.

If you want to be a councillor, you must make sure that you are officially nominated. This means getting 10 people to sign your nomination papers (signatories must be registered electors in the ward where you wish to stand) available from elections@lancaster.gov.uk. All the necessary documents must be submitted 19 working days before the day of the election. For more detailed information please visit the Be a councillor website. There is additional support available if you're disabled and considering standing for elected office.

We want your views on our proposals to change the opening days and times of Lancashire's HWRCs.

We want to keep HWRCs open when residents are most likely to use them. We have categorised all of the HWRCs based on how busy they are and/or how close they are to another centre. We are proposing new opening days and times based on this.

Household Waste Recycling Centre

Consultation: Lancashire County Council is suggesting changes to the days and times Household Waste Recycling Centres (HWRCs) will open.

All the HWRCs have been categorised based on how busy they are and/or how close they are to another centre. New opening days and times have been put forward on this basis.

HWRC's currently have different opening hours during the summer (1st April to 30th September) and during the winter (1st October to 31st March). The summer opening times are 8am to 7pm and the winter opening hours 8am to 5pm. Based on an analysis carried out by Lancashire County Council are proposing to change the opening hours for HWRC's to 9am – 5pm for the entire year.

All 15 of Lancashire County Council's HWRC's

are open seven days a week (excluding Christmas Day, Boxing Day and New Year's Day). Lancashire County Council are proposing to open seven HWRC's for five days a week only, being Friday, Saturday and Sunday and two other days in the week based on usage data and the availability of alternative facilities. One of these is Carnforth household waste recycling centre.

Lancashire County Council, like many councils across the country, is going through financially challenging times because of funding not keeping pace with the increasing demand and cost of services being delivered. This means that they must consider changes to some services as they do not have the resources to continue to deliver what they have in the past.

The HWRC's proposals are part of a much wider look at ways to reduce costs to help balance the books for future years and they are now consulting on what impact these proposals might have locally. The consultation is running until Monday 25th March 2019 and Carnforth Town Council want to hear your views before making their own formal response to the consultation. Once everyone's views have been received and the responses collated, the results will be fed back to Lancashire County Council and form part of their decision-making process.

Macmillan Cancer Information and Support Bus: The Macmillan bus is returning to the War Memorial Gardens on **Thursday 28th March 2019 from 10am to 4pm.** The bus operates as a free mobile information service. On board are a team of cancer information specialists who offer Information and support to anyone with a concern or question relating to cancer.

When they were last in Carnforth in January the team were able to support over 80 people which is fantastic! No appointments are required, and anyone is welcome either to just pick up leaflets or have a face to face conversation. All information is free and confidential.

Friends, family and colleagues bid farewell to Councillor Pat Wooff: Last December the Town Council sadly lost its longest serving Councillor.

Below is a report courtesy of the Westmorland Gazette – which says everything that you need to know about Pat's extraordinary life. The Town will greatly miss her.

The grandmother-of-two's funeral took place at Beetham Hall Crematorium on Tuesday 18th December 2018, followed by a reception at the Longlands Hotel, Tewitfield. The former magistrate died at home following a short illness on Monday, December 3. She was 80 years old.

Her dear friend CIIr Bob Roe, Mayor of Carnforth, was among those paying warm tribute to Mrs Wooff's dedication to the town, in a public service career spanning more than four decades. "I'd known Pat for more than 25 years," said Town Mayor Mr Roe, "...and in that time she became my best friend, companion, mentor, you name it. She was there for me all the time. She was a joy to work with. Her contribution was vast, to so many organisations. She will be very sorely missed."

The young Patricia moved to Carnforth in 1954 from Wales, when her father was promoted to relief stationmaster. She and her late husband, Lance, from Warton, had two children, Philip and Leonie, and two grandsons, Christian and Oliver.

Mrs Wooff's close ties with the council began in the 1970's. Last year she told the Gazette she had fond memories of "a smashing year" during 1977 when Carnforth celebrated the Queen's Silver Jubilee. She chaired the council that year, which saw the town's swimming pool opened and every child given a commemorative mug at the former Steamtown railway museum, home of the Flying Scotsman, where Mrs Wooff worked.

Cllrs Wooff and Roe first served as mayor and deputy together in 2005, attending a Buckingham Palace garden party and a reception hosted by Prime Minister Gordon Brown at 10 Downing Street to celebrate community work.

Mrs Wooff became mayor again in 2010 and 2017. She was passionate about the role played by Carnforth Air Training Corps' young cadets. For several years she ran a pensioners' drop-in afternoon at Carnforth Civic Hall and more recently she helped at the town's mental health cafe, Serenity. Mrs Wooff played a key part in the recent and successful campaign to keep Carnforth's swimming pool open.

Back in 1986 she chaired the first public meeting to save the town's iconic railway station from closure. That gathering led to Carnforth Station Trust being formed, of which Mrs Wooff was a director. Poignantly, her final public duty was to organise this year's Christmas party for the friends of the trust, said Mr Roe, adding: "She was active right up to the last week of her life."

Back in January 2017, when Mrs Wooff was elected to be mayor for the third time, she told the Gazette: "I'm proud to serve the town; I think it's quite an honour. "It's just a good community to live in and we try to keep it that way." She also praised her colleagues on Carnforth Town Council as "..a fantastic bunch, such a dedicated band of people with a wealth of knowledge". Town councillors were among the many mourners at the funeral.

Mayor Mr Roe said his friend took her town council duties "seriously but not too seriously" and had the knack of finding just the right moment to make a light-hearted comment in meetings. "She was such an excellent lady whose work for the town will be greatly missed," said Mr Roe, publican at the Shovel Inn. "Everybody knew her. She touched many people's lives. She wasn't doing it for her own glory, she just did it to help people"
