Is it time for close circuit television (CCTV)?



After several well-publicised robberies in the centre of Carnforth over the past two years, the Town Council has started to explore the feasibility of installing a small number of public CCTV cameras in and around the Town centre. Initial reaction to the idea from the business community and the Police has been supportive but we think that it is equally important to hear the views of residents before any further work is undertaken.

It's important to bear in mind that CCTV is widespread in public places and in private businesses and homes all over the country but, at present, Carnforth has no operational public CCTV system. So should we go down the same as our neighbouring towns Lancaster, Morecambe and Kendal and install a system of public CCTV cameras? What are the pros and cons? To help you formulate your own opinions, we thought it would be useful to consider a few obvious questions.

Are security cameras an invasion of privacy? In the UK there are no laws that prohibit the use of surveillance cameras in public places. According to several recent public surveys, so long as CCTV cameras are not installed in private places, most people do not consider them an invasion of privacy.

What are the benefits of CCTV in public places? Most people agree that CCTV cameras in public places increase their sense of security and public safety and help to reduce the fear of crime. Not only can security cameras record crime as it is committed, they can also help deter criminal acts. Survey evidence supports the view that CCTV cameras can help reduce the rate of crime, but it is clear they alone cannot stop crime completely. However, when a crime is committed where high quality CCTV cameras are available, the chances of catching a criminal are much higher. Any footage that captures a crime being committed can be used in a court of law as evidence against the accused and, when necessary, to prove someone's innocence.

What are the disadvantages of CCTV? Some people fear that CCTV cameras will be abused or misused and there have been some widely reported instances where cameras have been installed by voyeurs in highly inappropriate locations. It is also a fact that CCTV cameras would be unlikely to deter anyone from a crime of passion or a terrorist act. Another view is that CCTV systems are far too expensive to install and maintain and argue that the cost outweighs the any public benefit they might deliver.

Who would be able to access the information from CCTV? Recent data protection regulations have increased the obligations on those who manage CCTV systems to safeguard recorded information. Access to this information must be strictly controlled and will only be released to Police only in the event a crime being committed. The Town Council is likely to engage a specialist company, or agency, to manage any system it decided to install. A similar arrangement is operated by Lancaster City Council and other local authorities to ensure compliance with data protection and quality assurance standards.

What is Carnforth Town Council's view about CCTV? The Town Council senses that something needs to happen to deter criminals from thinking Carnforth offers 'easy pickings'.

It's unlikely that we will see any appreciable rise in Police cover in the coming years given the pressures on public sector budgets.

So, do we sit back and do nothing and just hope that out-of-town and more locally based criminals find even easier pickings elsewhere? Or, do we install a small number of public CCTV cameras at strategic points around the Town centre as a first step towards making Carnforth safer for residents and visitors alike? The Town Council isn't willing to fritter away public money – your money – on CCTV systems that don't deliver quality and value for money and that don't come with all the necessary safeguards about privacy and data control, but would

you like us to continue with our examination of a suitable CCTV system for Carnforth?

The Town Council is delighted to introduce our Town Mayor for 2019/2020 – Kath Bromilow MBE. Kath will be a well-known face to many around the town, but here Kath tells us a little more about herself! I am very proud to say that I was born and grew up in Leyland Lancashire and that I still visit frequently to see family and friends. I am the third oldest in a family of seven sisters and one brother and I class myself as a down to earth Lancashire Lass.!

I now live in Over Kellet with my husband, John, and between us we have four wonderful children and six lovely grandchildren who all live in different parts of the country. I started working life with Lancashire Fire and Rescue Service at Euxton near Chorley before joining Greater Manchester Police. In 2003, after 17 years with GMP, I transferred Forces and joined Lancashire Constabulary, where I undertook several roles including being the Community Beat Manager for Carnforth.

I have a wealth of experience gained from 30 years' service as a Police Officer. I also have vast experience of working with young people through my involvement with the Volunteer Police Cadets (VPC). I was instrumental in setting up the VPC and over the last few years I have been the Development Manager of the VPC programme, assisting in the development of the Police Cadets Programme throughout the United Kingdom. In the same year, I was awarded my highest achievement to date when I received an MBE from Her Majesty the Queen for Services to Policing.

In 2011, after many years working alongside numerous Rotary Clubs on community projects, I joined Carnforth Rotary Club. I believe in the values and principles of Rotary, primarily that of "Service above Self". Since then, I have never looked back and I thoroughly enjoy being a member of Rotary International. In 2017-18, I served as President of Carnforth Rotary Club – it was an unforgettable year and the Club delivered some great projects in the area. Carnforth Neighbourhood Plan:

Carnforth Neighbourhood Plan Working Group (CNPWG), supported by the Town Council, is continuing to work with consultants Troy Planning and Design to prepare a Neighbourhood Plan for the town that will be a blue-print for its future as part of the emerging Lancaster District Local Plan.



A detailed *Carnforth Baseline Assessment* has been drafted and the evidence from this has informed revisions to the original *Vision and Objectives* whilst staying true to the main themes that were identified as part of the initial consultation with the local community. Both documents and more information on our developing neighbourhood plan can now be found on our website http://carnforthtowncouncil.org/neighbourhood-planning/

At the beginning of July, we were delighted to be awarded funding from Central Government that will enable us to complete the neighbourhood planning process and produce a Carnforth Neighbourhood Plan for consultation, followed by a public referendum for its adoption sometime in the first half of next year.

About the same time, the team were also awarded much sought-after technical support to undertake a Housing Needs Assessment (HNA) that will provide vital evidence to help to understand the expected demand for housing in the local area. The work will include generating policy options for housing; calculating a suitable housing needs figure; determining the type and size of new dwellings and establishing the need for affordable housing and any specialist requirements such as properties for older residents and newly formed households.

Further specialist work will be sought in due course, but over the Summer the CNPWG will be assessing our local green spaces and working with a government appointed body AECOM on the housing needs assessment, whilst preparing our strategy for engaging further with the local community on the developing neighbourhood plan.

This is a big deal for our town with the adopted Carnforth Neighbourhood Plan setting out and influencing its development for many years to come. **EXCITING TIMES!**Councillor Malcolm Watkins & Bob Bailey

Have your say on our roads: You can now have your say on our local roads and transport as part of a new campaign to promote the work of Lancashire County Council, Highways. They are encouraging people to complete the National Highways and Transport (NHT) survey, which measures public satisfaction with services across different local authorities.

The campaign focuses on the County Council's work fixing around 40,000 potholes a year and the fact that the number of potholes have reduced by 38% in the last two years by more being reported by the public on their website. This year the County Council plan to spend £24m to maintain Lancashire's 4,600 miles of highways and 5,300 miles of footways and to continue investment to help improve the condition of the county's roads.
