Some of our older readers may remember a TV programme from the 1960s called *That Was The Week That Was*. Hosted by David Frost, the programme would satirise topical news stories and issues each week in comedy sketches and in song.

Thinking of TW3 set me wondering what David Frost and his colleagues would have made of 2020. We've been told – more than once – that we're living in unprecedented times. Well, perhaps we are because the vast majority of us haven't previously experienced anything quite like the restrictions forced on us by the Covid pandemic. But what of previous generations? What would it have been like to live through the Blitz, evacuation and the food rationing of World War Two and what would it have been like to experience the consequences of the mass slaughter of World War One only to be faced with the Spanish 'Flu epidemic of 1918-19?

This year has certainly been tough and in some cases tragic. Carnforth Town Council lost one of its number to Covid when Councillor Val Armstrong died in October. The full effect of the second wave of Covid is still being felt nationally despite the recently imposed lockdown restrictions. And yet, as we stand close to the end of this unprecedented year, we've just heard of the emergence of an effective vaccine and we're anticipating a mass vaccination programme if not before Christmas then certainly early in 2021.

When we look back on 2020 we should look for some of the more positive aspects of the year rather than the negative. Here in Carnforth we saw the almost spontaneous creation in early April of a Covid support team made up of volunteers who came together to help the more vulnerable members of our community. They and the 90 or so unsung heroes and heroines who were nominated for our Carnforth Citizen of Merit Award have demonstrated that there's every reason to be positive about human nature and to be proud of the community spirit that exists and that is vibrant here in our brilliant town. It is fantastic that we have just heard that our efforts have gained recognition from the High Sheriff of Lancashire (more of that later!).

So, don't be downhearted. Past generations faced terrible trials and tribulations and came through them. We can, and will, do the same. Have a happy Christmas and let's all look forward to a much better 2021!

The plan is now in its first draft and will be out for consultation in the New Year with the aim of it being adopted by the Summer.

The Council is also playing its part at a strategic level representing the views of all our residents and community groups at a local and county level. We have mutual respect and good working relationships with both Lancaster City and Lancashire County Councils which means that we can work closely together to provide support and help in response to COVID19 and have open and frank discussions on things like the Lancaster District Local Plan, the Eden Project, strategic plans around the A601(M) and Lundsfield Quarry developments.

Five Golden reasons to shop local this Christmas

Many of us dread this time of year. Unless you're the most organised person on earth and have done your Christmas shopping by Halloween, the sudden realisation that we are only a few weeks from Christmas Day can send us into a flat spin, and this year more than any other has got us all in one of those!



Luckily here in Carnforth, we have many independent businesses and shops and it is easy to find gifts while supporting our local

shops. This year more than any other it is important that we support our local traders to help them weather the storm of coronavirus. They have been there for us all this time, now it's time for us to be there for them.

So, I want to give you some good reasons to shop local this Christmas and support our local traders.....

Shopping locally is a lot less stressful. Shopping in Carnforth is much nicer than battling the Christmas crowds at a large shopping complex, the stress of one-way systems, car park queues and playing human dodgems. It also removes the pressure of waiting at home for that 'it-should have-arrived-two-days-ago' gift ordered online from Amazon (other on-line retailers are available).

Your spending will boost our economy, Research on local spending shows that for every £1 spent with a small or medium-sized business 63p stayed in the local economy, compared to 40p with a larger business. Small businesses will be vital for national economic recovery and growth and are leading the way in innovation and new job creation. They serve the needs of the local economy and many provide services to larger businesses, helping your local community and beyond!

By spending money with local businesses, you are paying a friend or neighbour's salary. Small Businesses integrate into the local community and tailor their services and products accordingly - therefore it is unlikely that a small business is going to move to a different city or country, therefore keeping jobs in your community.

You are likely to get better service. Local business owners do what they do because they are passionate about their products and typically take more time to get to know their customers. They will often go the extra mile to help you and to ensure you are a satisfied customer, and you will get good advice too. Shopping at a local business means you are more likely get an expert opinion about the products that you're purchasing. Local business owners are well informed about their products and know what they are selling.

You can get a good deal. It's a well-known fact that many larger shops 'jump on the bandwagon' at this time of year with 'black Friday offers' that might not be the great value suggested. In our local high streets, many independent retailers are retaliating this year with real pre-Christmas promotions - and it's well worth taking a look!

Furthermore, independent retailers can use their discretion to reward regular custom, and it can mean you get discounts on the items you actually want to buy, rather than being tempted by multi-buy offers in the big chains. It is very likely that businesses will be doing special promotions and discounts; therefore you could save some money AND support your local traders at the same time! Prices on the internet are not always the cheapest - especially as Christmas Day approaches. What's more, you'll not have to pay for postage.

Napoleon once called us "a nation of shopkeepers" hoping to insult us. However, it's a big part of our national identity and is something to be proud of. Small businesses have endured the Blitz, 3-day weeks and more recent economic down turns and with our help this year, they will survive this too. Let us avoid having a 'clone street' with the same shops as everywhere else and support our local businesses in Carnforth and our surrounding villages this Christmas.

As crafters and makers, ourselves, we understand the importance of making time and space to create our own unique pieces of art, be it through felting, spinning, weaving painting, photography, ceramics, stitching – the list goes on!

As Carnforth Creatives we also recognise the importance of our local landscape, our coastline, woodlands, lakes and canal, not only in inspiring our art but also in ensuring our health and wellbeing. Many visitors come to this area every year to enjoy what we have on our doorstep. Many of them are makers and crafters themselves who come for inspiration and attend courses and workshops, whilst enjoying shopping for art materials and supplies.

Did you know that there is an established creative community of businesses within Carnforth offering unique opportunities? Over the years these businesses, often small, sometimes individual, always unique have grown and are continuing to thrive.

'Artisan' at 2 New Street, Carnforth is a family owned business and is the UK supplier of high quality Norwegian and German wool fibre and yarn, brilliant for felt making, tapestry weaving, and spinning. If you wish to take your studies further you can with ArtyBird Carnforth School for Art and Textiles, a City and Guilds Accredited Centre that teaches from beginners through to professional. This internationally recognised school has a wide community of makers who are enjoying developing their passion for their own enjoyment as well as those who wish to work within the business.

As well as our annual September intake, across our wide range of subjects such as: feltmaking, weaving and tapestry weaving, embroidery and creative textiles, dyeing and printing, dressmaking and creative computing, we have a growing on-line community through LearnWorlds with our expanding suite of short courses that can be a creative feast for those working from home. We are offering a 20% discount on these short courses up until Christmas, using code Carnforth20. Keep up to date on Facebook or visit our website at www.artybirdscarnforth.co.uk.

There are other creative businesses and groups in Carnforth. You can buy Art Supplies from Aurelian Barbu Art Supplies and Carnforth Bookshop, who also have a range of new and second-hand craft books. Local photographer Liz Withey has a host of local interest calendars that can be bought online or from Carnforth Post Office. We have a thriving creative community. Carnforth is home to painters, textile artists, ceramists, crafters, photographers and hosts – we normally have an annual Art Festival in August, where you can buy everything from beautiful wood pieces, to prints, to cards and even a pimped pair of DMs, intricately etched in a variety of designs, that you will not find anywhere else! The War Memorial Gardens and Ashtrees Way get yarn bombed at the same time, which just brings a smile and adds even more colour to our lovely town!

Care in our Community

What is an Integrated Care Community (ICC)? Integrated teams of health and care workers, voluntary organisations and wider community assets who work together to support

and improve the health and wellbeing of our local communities. Anyone who is registered to a GP practice in Morecambe Bay belongs to an ICC. You can find out more by going to https://www.morecambebayccg.nhs.uk/get-involved/integrated-care-communities

Referrals to our Integrated Care Community (ICC) Care Coordinator: Care Coordinators can take referrals from anyone, for anyone with mild to moderately complex physical, mental or social care needs where coordination of multiple issues, that may require input from one or more services are required, either to facilitate a safe discharge from hospital, avoid a hospital admission, reduce isolation or maintain good health and wellbeing.

If you are unsure whether a referral is appropriate for the ICC, we are happy to take calls to discuss. Please ensure you have consent to refer and ask which GP surgery they are registered with. Contact us on 01524 591643 and ask to speak to the Care Coordinator.

Please note, we will triage and respond to all referrals in a timely manner, but we are not an emergency service so if you feel that the something needs urgent attention please contact the relevant GP practice, 111 or 999.

We continue to hold our monthly steering group meetings, which are currently being held virtually. It is such a great meeting with lots of partners coming together to share best practice and offer advice and support to each other.

We are working with some partners on projects like Carnforth Community Swimming Pool, to create sessions for those whose health and wellbeing may have been affected by COVID, and with the very generous support of Carnforth Rotary, ensuring some of our most isolated residents receive a nice gift over the Christmas period.

Emergency Assistance Grant Scheme

Carnforth Town Council are proud to support Lancaster City Council's emergency grant scheme to assist people who are struggling to afford food and other essential items due to financial hardship caused by COVID19. This scheme is temporary.

are you self-employed and your business has seen a significant fall in income If any of the above applies to you, the scheme could help you pay for urgent essentials such as food, school uniforms, gas and electricity and household appliances.

Grants for Covid-19 affected businesses: Grants are available to support businesses affected by the Lancaster district's move into additional Covid-19 restrictions in September (Tier 2) and October (Tier 3) and the subsequent national lockdown.

Businesses, along with non-profit organisations, eligible to apply are those which:

- ✓ Have a rateable value and have been severely impacted
- ✓ Don't have a rateable value and have either closed or otherwise been severely impacted

This includes businesses without a rateable value who have ongoing fixed business costs. Businesses with a rateable value and have been required to close by law are eligible for the Local/National Restrictions Support Grant (LRSG) scheme. Remembrance Sunday

It was with a great deal of sadness that the Town Council had no choice but to cancel our planned Remembrance Day Parade and Service on Sunday 8th November. We were though determined to ensure that the town officially remembered those who had given their lives to ensure that we still can live in a democratic country. So, a short service was arranged within Government guidelines.

The names of the fallen were read out and the Town Mayor, Kath Bromilow, laid a wreath on behalf of the people of Carnforth. Several people attended at the War Memorial Gardens to share in remembrance, some also laying a wreath on behalf of community organisations within COVID19 restrictions. The Town Clerk recorded the Service and streamed the event live on the Town Council's Facebook with nearly 90 people tuning in.

Since then, nearly 1,500 people have watched the video - showing their respects to those who gave their lives for our freedom and appreciating that we were able to share the event. Just as we, in Carnforth, were commemorating those who gave their lives in the service of our country, in our French twin town, Sailly sur la Lys, the mayor, Jean-Claude Thorez, laid wreaths on the graves of French soldiers and on the graves of British soldiers who died in both World Wars. He said, "We give homage to these men who gave their lives to defend us.

We remember them and we thank them. One thing is sure, that at such moving times, our friends from Carnforth are present in our hearts and in our thoughts." Both the French national


