In early December, there was an unexpected shake-up at Carnforth Town Council with all twelve councillors suddenly deciding that had had enough and all walking out, handing over all their responsibilities to the 1st Carnforth Scouts! But there was no need for residents to worry – or celebrate –as this was simply an interesting experiment designed to introduce young people to local democracy and to encourage their interest, and influence, in what happens in their local community.

The Scouts, who range in age between 10 and 14 years old, were given the task of producing a budget that takes account not only of the Town Council's normal expenditure and fixed costs, such as the Town's community amenities, but that also balanced these with income projections and plans for new projects like the Queen's Platinum Jubilee Street Festival in June 2022 or, indeed, any new plans that the Scouts could come up with!


The first item of the night was to elect the new Town Mayor! There were 5 nominations and each was given an opportunity to say why they wanted to be the Mayor. After a close vote Jake Lawton was duly elected and immediately took control of the Chair's Gavel and the meeting!

The group then split into three teams and were soon fully engaged in debate about what was essential, desirable or just not needed for our town and its residents. They also considered where savings and efficiencies could be made and income generated – democracy at its finest!

There was a bit of a risk at one point that I might lose my job, but I am glad to say that soon passed! There was much discussion on just how much positive influence they, as elected Councillors, could have on shaping our local community.



They became so engaged in their deliberations that they worked through their break – just grabbing a biscuit and a drink before getting back to it!



After about 45 minutes of intense debate Town Mayor Jake called for order and each group was given the opportunity to feedback on their decisions and to explain how they had managed to balance the budget - they even set out their plans for what they would do in the next few years! They all recognised how difficult it can be to deliver services within a limited budget but all of them fully justified their decisions even when challenged by the residents (being 'former' Councillors in attendance)! In the remaining 15 minutes all the Scouts were given an opportunity to have their say on what they would like to see improved or developed in their town. They provided some fantastic ideas for the Town Council to consider.

Every one of the Scouts was a shining example of our local youth and showed how invested they all are in what happens in their community. If they are the Councillors of the future it looks very bright indeed! Carnforth Town Council is delighted to have planned and hosted this event and to have given the Scouts an opportunity to achieve an element of their Chief Scout Gold Award and to see democracy in action. Money matters (but sadly doesn't grow on trees!)

Very few people would dispute that the last two years have been the most difficult in recent living memory. In response to the remorseless surge of the Covid pandemic, thousands of schools and businesses closed and millions of people have been furloughed or made redundant. And almost two years on, the Covid mortality figure for this country now exceeds 153,000. The impact has been both tragic and devastating for so many of us.

When considering how our world has been stood on its head during this time, it may seem insensitive to begin talking about money but we must now plan for a future without restrictions and where we are all managing to live with coronavirus.

From a central and a local government perspective, planning involves money and the process has already begun to plan what services will be required in the year ahead and what the cost will be. Next month all householders will be receiving their Council Tax bills for 2022/23 from their local authorities. Locally our bills will be sent out by Lancaster City Council and will set out not only how much we will be asked to pay but also how and where our money will be allocated. The biggest slice will go to Lancashire County Council to pay for adult social care,

roads, schools and libraries amongst other things. Next in line is Lancaster City Council who provide waste collection, environmental health and housing amongst their services. After the two largest local authorities come the Police and the Fire Services. Finally, our bills will show how much Carnforth Town Council, a minnow by comparison to the others, will be asking for. In cash terms, Carnforth Town Council will be asking householders, in Band D properties for example, for just over £1 a week.



During 2021 we built on our achievements in recent years, despite the ongoing pandemic to: deliver a highly successful Street Festival; take on the stewardship of Crag Bank Village Hall and invest in its long term future as a valuable community asset; organise a welcome return to the Remembrance Day Parade; continued to take a lead on the emerging *Carnforth Neighbourhood Plan*; presented the Town with a 'buddy bench' in recognition of our wonderful NHS and keyworkers; secured the efficiency and effectiveness of the Town Council in serving our local community through modern technology and kept our residents and local community up-to-date with news and official information – and there has been a lot of it - through our website and social media platforms and the pages of the popular *Carnforth Express*. We also gave financial support to local community groups and collaborated with, and assisted, others including the Carnforth Covid 19 local support group, Carnforth Business Network and the Friends of Crag Bank Play Area as well as continuing to promote the Town and maintain part of its public realm and environment.

Our planning for the next financial year has considered the impact of the coronavirus and the 'cost of living' on our finances; our plans to maintain or enhance current services and activities and to build on our capacity to improve our resilience whilst delivering our ambitious plans and aspirations for the Town in the coming year and beyond – and all for around a £1 a week! **Councillor Jim Grisenthwaite**

We were delighted to see so many people join us, especially as our own Carol Service in the church had to be restricted for numbers.

This year the Town Council assisted us in promoting the event with banners placed on their new advertising boards located at the entrances into town.

Early in December we were contacted by Carnforth High School and asked if we would accept food for the foodbank which had been collected by the pupils in lieu of a non-uniform day. What a great idea! The school brought a lot to the collection point in our shop and we later collected more from the school which resulted in almost a full van load of food going to Morecambe Bay Foodbank on their next pick up from our Preston Street building. Thank you so much to Carnforth High School staff and pupils for your generosity and allowing us to assist another of our partner agencies. The basket at our shop is always available for Foodbank donations and some donors have brought bags of food to Preston Street – please just



bear in mind that we are only usually in Preston Street on Tuesday & Wednesday mornings.

In the two weeks up to Christmas we received requests to assist families in our area. It was our privilege to be entrusted with these tasks and we pray that all received something that helped make their Christmas a little more special. On Christmas Day we served up around twenty-five meals to people who otherwise might have been alone or vulnerable on this special day. This would not be possible without our volunteers and helpers like Tracy and Tina who created the meal; the Stretch family who helped with the cooking and serving and ensured that every guest got a present; Dave & Julie Wattam and Michael Burrows who picked up guests and took them home afterwards. But special thanks to our local community whose donations ensured that meals could be provided and cooked in our lovely new kitchen!

As we go into the New Year, we are following guidance and looking to restart some activities such as Singing By Heart and Lunch Club. Watch this space! Meanwhile the Prop Up Project has continued throughout the pandemic and family social meetings every Wednesday morning during school holidays has returned. Coffee Morning also on a Wednesday remains popular and held in our main worship hall to allow for social distancing. The Band rehearses on Tuesday evenings and we have an online prayer group and Bible Study on Wednesday nights. Worship continues at 10am on Sunday mornings. We are a little restricted to numbers due to space but do get in touch if you would like to join us. Our shop is open Monday – Saturday (except Wednesday). Memorial.



Carnforth submits its Neighbourhood Plan

They will check that the CNP meets all legal requirements before arranging a statutory six week consultation period and the subsequent appointment of an independent examiner.

The submission is the culmination of a great deal of work over almost 4 years. The CNP has been developed to enable community to take greater control on the type and scale of development and land use in the town as well as measures and aspirations to protect heritage; tackle climate change, traffic management and air quality and influence our local economy and tourism.

The Plan sets out our vision, objectives and aspirations for the Town to 2031 and implementation will be regularly monitored and reviewed. This CNP is a great achievement and the Town Council is very proud of the final product.
